to provide for the establishment of Mufti-e-Azam Islamic University, Islamabad

Whereas it is expedient to create an institution of higher education that upholds and promotes Islamic values, principles and knowledge and acts as a center of excellence for its modern approach towards Islamic teachings and establishment of Mufti-e-Aam Islamic University, Islamabad, and for the matters connected therewith orancillary thereto;

It is hereby enacted as follows:-

## Chapter I

Preliminary

## 1. Short title, application, and commencement.

(1) This Act shall be called the Mufti-e-Azam Islamic University Act, 2023.
(2) it shall come into force on such date as the Minister for Education may, by notification in the official gazette specify, after appraisal by the Higher Education Commission that the University meet the eligibility criteria fixed by the Commission.
2. Definitions._In this Act unless there is anything repugnant in the subject or context;
(a) "Academic Council" means the Academic Council of the University;
(b) "Affiliated College" means an educational institution affiliated with the University but not maintained or administered by it;
(c) "Authority" means any of the Authorities of the University specified or setup in terms of section 15;
(d) "Chancellor" means the Chancellor of the University,
(e) "College" means a constituent college or an Affiliated College;
(f) "Commission" means the Higher Education Commission set up by the HigherEducation Commission Ordinance, 2002 (LIII of 2002);
(g) " Constituent College" means an educational institution, by whatever
namedescribed, maintained and administered by the University;
(h) "Controller Examinations" refers to University Controller Examinations;
(i) "Dean" means the head of a Faculty or the head of an academic bodygranted the status of a Faculty by this Act or by the Statutes or Regulations;
(j) "Department" means a teaching department mapaitained and administered, or recognized by the University in the manner prescribed;
(k) "Director" means the head of an institute established as a constituentinstitution by the University as may be prescribed;
(I) "Faculty" means an administrative and academic unit of the Universityconsisting of one or more departments, as preacribed;
(m) "Government" means the federal government;
(n) "Vice-Chancellor" means the Vice-Chancellor of the University;
(0) "Prescribed" means prescribed by Statutes, Regulations, or Rules and madeunder the Act;
(p) "Principal" means the head of a College;
(q) "Registrar" refers to the university registrar;
(r) "Representation Committees" means the Representation Committeesconstituted under section 24;
(s) "Review Panel" means the Review Panel set up by the Chancellor in accordance with the provisions of section 9;
(t) "Schedule" means a Schedule to the Act;
(u) "Search Committee" means the Search Committee set up by the Senateunder section 11;
(v) "Senate" means the Senate of the University;
$(\mathbf{w})$ "Statutes", "Regulations" and "Rules" mean respectively the statutes, the regulations and the rules made under this act and for the time being in force;
(x) "Syndicate" means the Syndicate of the University;
(y) "Teachers" include Professors, Associate Professors, Assistant Professors and Lecturers engaged whole-time by the University or by a College and such other personas may be declared to be teachers by Regulations;
(z) "Tweasurer" means the Treasurer of the University;
(aa)"University" means Mufti-e-Azam University, Islamabad; and
(bb) "University Teacher" means a whole-time teacher appointed and paid by the University, or recognized by the University as such.
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## Chapter II

## The University

3. Incorporation._ (1) There shall be established a University to be called "Mufti-e-Azam University" in accordance with provisions of this Act.
(2) The univesity shall consist of the following, namely: $\qquad$
(a) The Chancellor, the members of the Senate, and the Vice-Chancellor;
(b) The members of the Authorities of the University established under Section 15;
(c) All University teachers, employees, and individuals recognized as studentsं of the University in accordance with the term and conditions specifigd from time to time; and
(d) All other full-time officers and members of the staff of the University.
(2) The principal seat of the University shall be at Islamabad and it may set up any number of its campuses, colleges, institutes, offices, research or study centers, and otherfacilities at such places in Pakistan as well as abroad as the Senate may determine. However additional campuses shall be set up in other parts of the country/abroad only after their evaluation by the Higher Education Commission to determine whether they meet the eligibility criteria fixed by the Commission.
(3) The University shall be a body corporate by the name of the Mufti-e-Azam University, Islamabad and shall have perpetual succession and a commonseal, and may sue and be sued by the said name.


#### Abstract

(4) The University shall be competent to acquire and hold property, both


 movable and immovable, and to lease, sell or otherwise transfer any movable and immovable property which may have become vested in orbeen acquired by it in a manner as prescribed.(5) Notwithstanding anything contained in any other law for the time being in force, the University shall have academic, financial, and administrative autonomy, including the power to employ officers, teachers and other employees on such terms and conditions as may be prescribed, subject to the provisions of this Act and the Higher Education Commission Ordinance, 2002 (LIII of 2002). In particular without prejudice to the authority granted to the Commission by the law, the Government or an authority or auditor appointed by the government shall have nower to question the policy underlying the allocation of resources approved by the Senate in the annual budget of the University.
4. Powers and purposes of the University. _ The University shall have the following powers, namely:-
i. to provide for education and scholarship in such branches of knowledge asit may deem fit, and to make provisions for research, service to society and for the application, advañ"cement, and dissemination of knowledge in such manner as it may determine;
ii. to prescribe courses of studies to be conducted by it and the Colleges;
iii. to hold examinations and to award and confer degrees, diplomas, certificates, and other academic distinctions to and on persons who have been admitted to and have passed its examinations under prescribed conditions;
iv. to prescribe the terms and conditions of employment of the officers, teachers, and other employees of the University and to lay down terms and conditions that may be different from those applicable to government servants in general;
V. to engage, where necessary, persons on contracts of specified duration andto specify the terms of each engagement;
vi. to confer honorary degrees or other distinctions on approved persons inthe manner prescribed;
vii. to provide for such instruction for persons not being students of the

Liviversity as it may prescribe, and to grant certificates and diplomas tosuch persons;
viii. to establish programs for the exchange of students and teachers between the university and other universities, educational institutions, and research organizations, inside as well as outside Rakistan;
ix. to provide career counseling and job search services to students and afumni;
X. to maintain linkages with alumni;
xi. to develop and implement fund-raising plans;
xii. terprovide and support the academic development of the faculty of the University;
xiii. to confer degrees on persons who have carried on independent researchunder prescribed conditions;
xiv. to accept the examinations passed and the period of study spent by students of the University at other Universities and places of learning equivalent to such examinations and periods of study in the University, as itmay prescribe, and to withdraw such acceptance;
XV. to co-operate with other universities, public authorities, or private organizations, inside as well as outside Pakistan, in such manner and forsuch purposes as it may prescribe;
xvi. to institute Professorships, Associate Professorships, Assistant Professorships and Lectureships, and any other posts and to appoint persons thereto;
xvii. to create posts for research, extension, administration, and other relatedpurposes and to appoint persons thereto;
xviii. to recognize selected members of the teaching staff of Affiliated Colleges oreducational institutions admitted to the privileges of the university or such other persons as it may deem fit, as University Teachers; $\star$
xix. to institute and award financial assistance to students in need, fellowships, scholarships, bursaries, medals, and prizes under
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prescribed conditions; i.
XX. to institute academic as well as professional degree programs allowingintake of international students including children/wards of overseas Pakistanis as much as possible;
xxi. to establish teaching departments, schools, colleges, faculties, institutes, additional campuses, museums, and other centers of learning in Pakistanand abroad for the development of teaching and research and to make such arrangements for their maintenance, management, and administration as it may prescribe; $\geqslant$
xxii. to provide for the residence of the students of the University and the colleges, to establish and maintain halls of residence, and approve or license hostels and lodging;
xxiii. to maintain order, discipline, and security on the campuses of the University and the Colleges;
xxiv. to promote the extracurricular and recreational activities of such students, and to make arrangements for promoting their health and general welfare;
$X X V$. to demand and receive such fees and other charges as it may determine;
Xxvi. to make provision for research, advisory, or consultancy services and with these objects to enter into arrangements with other institutions, public or private bodies, and commercialmand industrial enterprises under prescribedconditions;
XXVii. to enter into, carry out, vary or cancel contracts;
xxviii. to receive and manage property transferred and grants, contributions made to the university and to invest any fund representing such property, grants, bequests, trusts, gifts, donations, endowments or contributions insuch manner as it may deem fit;
xxix. to provide for the printing and publication of research and other works;
XXX. to do all such other acts and things, whether incidental to the
powers aforesaid or not, as may be requisite or expedient in order . to further the objectives of the University as a place of education, learning, and research;
xxxi. to receive grants, foreign aid, and loans from international banks; sand
xxxii. to provide distance learning to national and international students.
5. University open to all classes, creeds, etc._ (1) The University shall be open to all persons of either gender and of whatever religion; race, creed, class, color or domicile and no person shall be denied the privileges of the University on the grounds of religion, race, caste, creed, class, color or Domicile.
(2) An increase in any fee or charge that is in excess of ten percent Per annum on an annualized basis from the last such increase may not be made except in special circumstances, and only with the approval of the Chancellor.
(3) The Uniyersity shall institute financial aid programs for students in need, to the extent considered feasible by the senate given the resources available, so as to enable daission and accessto the university and the various opportunities provided by it to bebased on merit rather than the ability to pay:
Provided that the University may institute self-finance schemes not covering more than ten percent of the total number of candidates in any on-campus taught course or research-based programs of study.
6. Teaching at the University._ (1) All academic programs of the Institute shall be conducted in the prescribed manner and the Senate shall ensure that too courses of study, the curriculum and the practical work at. the University are comparable in standard with other similar Universities.
(2) All recognized teaching in various courses shall be conducted by the University or the Colleges in the prescribed manner ancd may include lectures, tutorials, discussions, seminars, demonstrations, distance learning, and other methods of instruction as well as practical work in laboratories, hospitals, workshops, other governmental or privateorga'nizations.
(3) The Authority responsible for organizing rerognized teachingshall be such as may be presccribed.
(4) The University shall associate inter.nal and external examiners in the conduct of examinations.

## Officers of the University

7. Principal Officers. _ The following shall be the principal officers of the University, namely:-
(a) the Chancellor;
(b) the Vice-Chancellor;
(c) the Pro Vice-Chancellor;
(d) the Deans;
(e) the Principals/Directors of the constituent Colleges;
(f) the Chairpersons of the teaching departments;
(g) the Registrar;
(h) the Treasurer;
(i) the Controller of Examinations; and
(j) such other persons as may be prescribed by the Statutes or Regulations tobe the principal officers of the University.
8. Chancellor._(1) The President of the Islamic Republic of Pakistan shall be the Chancellor of the University.
(2) The Chancellor shall, when present, preside over the meêtings of the Syndicate of the University.
(3) The members of the Senate as well as the Vice-Chancellor shall be appointed by the Chancellor from amongst the persons recommended by the Representation Committee set up for this purpose or the Searsh Committee established in accordance with this Act and the Statutes, as there as may be, along with those elected.
(4) If the Chancellor is satisfied that serious irregularity or mismanagement with respect to the affairs of the University has occurred, he may, as regards proceedings of the Senate, direct that specified proceedings be reconsidered and appropriate action taken within one month of the direction having been issued:

Provided that if the Chancellor is satisfied that either no reconsideration has been carried out or that the reconsideration has failed to address the concern expressed, he may, after calling uponthe Senate to show cause in writing, appoint a five-member Review Panel to examine and report to the Chancellor
on the functioning of the Senate. The report of the Review Panel shall be submitted within such time as may be prescribed by the Chancellor. The Review Panel shall be drawn from persons of eminence in academics and in the fields of law, accountancy, and administration or as deem fit by the Chancelloreand as regards proceedings of any Authority or with respect to matters within the competence of any Authority other than the Senate, direct the Senate to exercise powers under section 17.
(6) Everysproposal to confer an honorary degree shall be subject to confirmation by the Chancellor. However, the honorary degree shall beoffered only in the faculties available with the University.
(7) The Chancellor shall preside at the convocation of the University.
9. Removal from the Senate._ (1) The Chancellor may, upon the recommendation of the Review the Panel, remove any person from the membership of the Senate on the ground that such person has,-
(a) become of unsound mind; or
(b) become incapacitated to function as a member of the Senate; or
(c) been convicted by a court of law for an offense involving moral

- turpitude; or
(d) absented himself from two consecutive meetings without just * cause;or
(e) been guilty of misconduct, including use of position for the personaladvantage of any kind, or gross inefficiency in the
* performance of functions
(2) The, Chancellor shall remove any person from the membership of the Senate on a resolution calling for the removal of such a personsupported by at least three-fourths of the membership of the Senate:

Provided that before passing such a resolution the Senate shall provide the member concerned a fair hearing.
Provided further that the provisions of this section shall not be applicable to theVice-Chancellor in his capacity as a member of the Senate.
10. Vice-Chancellor._ (1) There shall be a Vice-Chancellor of the University who shall be an eminent academic or a distinguished administrator and shall beappointed by the Chancellor on the recommendation of the Search Committee for a period of four years and on such terms and conditions as the

Chancellor may determine.
(2) The Vice-Chancellor shall be the chief executive officer of the University responsible for all administrative and academic functions of the Universityand for ensuring that the provisions of the Act, Statutes, Regulations and Rules are faithfully observed in order to promote general efficiency and the good order of the University. The Vice-Chancellor shall have all powerspesctibed for this purpose, including administrative control over the officers, teachers, and other employees of the University. The vice-Chancellor shall if present, be entitled to attend any meeting ofany authority or body of the University.
(3) The Vice-Chancellor may in an emergency that in his opinion requires immediate action ordinarily not in the competence of the Vicemancellor, take such action and forward, within seventy-two hours, a report of the action taken to the members of the emergency committee of the Senate that will be chaired by Chancellor, to be set up by Statute. The Chancellor on behalf of the emergency committee may direct such further action as is considered appropriate.
(4) The Vice-Chancellor shall also have the following powers, namely:-
(a) to direct teachers, officers, and other employees of the University to take up such assignments in connection with the examination, administration, and such other activities in the university as he may consider necessary for the purposes of the University;
(b) to sanction by re-appropriation an amount not exceeding an amount prescribed by the Senate for an unforeseen item not provided forin the budget and report it to the Senate at the next meetiog;
(c) to make appointments of such categories of employees of the university and in such manner as may be prescribed by the Statutes;
(d) to suspend, punish and remove, in accordance with prescribed procedure, from service officers, teachers and other employees of the University except those appointed by or with the approval of the Senate;
(e) to delegate, subject to such conditions as may be prescribed, any of hispowers under this Act to an officer or officers of the University; and
(f) to exercise and perform such other powers and functions as may beprescribed;
(5) The Vice-Chancellor shall preside at the convocation of the University in theabsence of the Chancellor.
(6) The Vice-Chancellor shall present an annual report before the Senate withinthree months of the close of the academic year. The annual report shall present such information as regards the academic year under review as may be prescribed, including disclosure of all relevant facts pertaining to:
ak Academics;
b. Research;
c. Administration; and
d. Finances.
(7) The Vice-Chancellor's annual report shall be made available, prior to its presentation before the Senate, to all officers and University Teachers and shallbepublished in such numbers as are required to ensure its wide circulation.
11. Appointment and removal of the Vice-Chancellor. - (1) The ViceChancellor shall be appointed by the Chancellor based on recommendations made by the Senate.
(2) $\quad \mathrm{A}$ Search Committee for the recommendation of persons suitablefor appointment as Vice-Chancellor shall be constituted by the Senate on the date and in the manner prescribed by the Statutesand shall consist of two eminent members of society nominated by the Chancellor of whom one shall be appointed the convener, two members of the Senate, two distinguished University Teachers who are not members of the Senate and one academic of eminence not employed by the University. The two distinguished University Teachers shiall be selected by the Senate through a process, to be prescribed by the Senate that provides for the recommendation of suitable names by the Universityteachers in general.
(3) The Search Committee shall remain in existence till such timethat the appointment of the next Vice-Chancellor has been made by theChancellor.
(4) The persons proposed by the Search Committee for appointmentas Vice-Chançellor shall be considered by the Senate and of these a panel of three, in order of priority, shall be recommended by the Senate to the Chancellor

Provided that the Chancellor may decline to appoint any of the three persons recommended and seek the recommendation of a fresh panel. lim the event of a fresh recommendation being sought by the Chancellorm the Search Committee shall make a proposal to the Senate in the prescribed manner.
(5) The Vice-Chancellor shall be appointed for a renewable tenure of five years on terms and conditions prescribed by Statute. The tenure of an incumbent Vice-Chancellor shall be renewed by the Chancellor on receipt of a resolution of the Senate in support of such renewal:
Provided that the Chancellor may call upon the Senate to reconsider such resolution once.
(6) The Senate may, pursuant to a resolution on this behalf passed by threefourths of its membership, recommend to the Chancellor the removal of the Vice-Chancellor on the ground of inefficiency, moral turpitude, physical or mental incapacity, or gross misconduct, including misuse of position the personal advantage of any kind:

Provided further that the Chancellor may make a reference to the Senate stating the instances of inefficiency, moral turpitude, or physical or mental in capacitor gross misconduct on the part of the vice-chancellor that has cometo his notice. After consideration of the reference the Senate may, pursuanto a resolution on this behalf passed by two-thirds of its membershîp; recommend to the Chancellor the removal of the Vice-Chancellor.
Provided further that prior to a resolution for the removal of the ViceChancellor being voted upon the Vice-Chancellor shall be given an opportunity of being heard.
(7) A resolution recommending the removal of the Vice-Chancellor shall be submitted to the Chancellor forthwith. The Chancellor may accept the recommendation and order the removal of the Vice-Chancellor or return the recommendation to the Senate.
(8) At any time when the office of the Vice-Chancellor is vacant or the ViceChancellor is absent or is unable to perform the functions ofhis office due to illness or some other cause; the Senate shall make such arrangements for the performance of the duties of the Vice-Chancellor as it may deem fit.
12. Registrar. _ (1) There shall be a Registrar of the Univềrsity to be appointed by the Senate on the recommendation of the Vice- Chancellor, on such terms and conditions as may be prescribed.
(2) The experience as well as the professional and academic qualifications necessary for appointment to the post of the Registrar shall be as may be prescribed.
(3) The Registrar shall be a full-time officer of the University andshall,-
(a) be the administrative head of the secretariat of the Universityand be responsible for the provision of secretariat support to the Authorities of the University;
(b) be the custodian of the common seal and the academicrecords of the University;
(c) maintain a register of registered graduates in a prescribedmanner;
(d) supervise the process of election, appointment or nominationand
(e) perform such other duties as may be prescribed.
(4) The term of office of the registrar shall be a renewable period of three years:
Provided that the Senate may, on the advice of the Vice-Chancellor, terminate the appoint of the Registrar on grounds of inefficiency or misconduct in accordance with the prescribed procedure.
13. Treasurer._ (1) There shall be a Treasurer of the University to be appointed by the Senate on the recommendation of the Vice-Chancellor, on such terms and conditions as may be prescribed.
(2) The experience and the professional and academic qualifications necessary for appointment to the post of theTreasurer shall be as may be prescribed.
(3) The Treasurer shall be the chief financial officer of the University and shall,--
a. manăge the assets, liabilities, receipts, expenditures, funds, and investments of the University;
b. prepare the annual and revised budget estimates of the Universityand present them to the Syndicate thereof for approval and incorporation in the budget to be presented to the Senate;
c. ensure that the funds of the University are expended on the purposes for which they are provided;
d. have the accounts of the University audited annually so as to be available for submission to the Senate within six months of the closeof the financial year; and
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e. perform such other duties as may be prescribed.
(4) The term of office of the Treasurer shall be a renewable period of three years:
Provided that the Senate may, on the advice of the Vice-Chanceillor, terminate the appointment of the Treasurer on grounds of inefficiency ormisconduct in accordance with the prescribed procedure.
14. Controller of Examinations._(1) There shall be a Controller of Examinations, to be appointed by the Senate on the recommendation of the Vice- Chancellor, on such terms and conditions as may be prescribed.
(2)The minimum qualifications necessary for appointment to the post of the Controller of Examinations shall be as may be prescribed.
(3) The Controller of Examinations shall be a full-time officer of the University and shall be responsible for all matters connected with the conduct of examinations and perform such other duties as may be prescribed.
(4) The Controller of Examinations shall be appointed for a renewable term of three years:

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Provided that the Senate may, on the advice of the Vice-Chancellor, terminate the appointment of the Controller of Examinations on grounds ofinefficiency or misconduct in accordance with the prescribed procedure.

## Chapter IV

## Authorities of the University

15. Authorities._ (1) The following shall be the Authorities of the University, namely:-
(a) Authorities established by the Act,
i. The Sponsor;
ii. The Senate;
iii. The Syndicate; and
iv. The Academic Council.
(b) Authorities to be established by the Statutes shall be,-- w
i. Graduate and Research Management Council;
ii. Recruitment, Development, Evaluation, and Promotion committees
for teachers and other staff whether at the level ofthe department, the Faculty, or the University;
iii. Career placement and Internship Committee of each Faculty.
iv. Search Committee for the appointment of the Vice-Chancellor,
v. The Representation Committees for appointment to the Senate., Syndicate and the Academic Council;
vi. Faculty Council; and
vii. Departmental Council.
(2) The Senate, the Syndicate, and the Academic Council may set up such other Committees or Sub-Committees, by whatever name described, as are considered desirable through Statutes or Regulations as appropriate. Such Committees or Sub-Committees shall be Authorities of the University for the purposes of this Act.
16. Senate, _ (1) The body responsible for the governance of the University shall be described as the Senate, and shall consist of the following, namely:-
a. The Chancellor who shall be the Chairperson of the Senate;
$b_{\text {. }}$ The Vice-Chancellor;
c. One member of the Government not below the rank of Joint Educational Advisor/Joint Secretary from the ministry concerned;
d. Four persons from society at large being persons of distinction in the fields of administration, management, education, academics, law, accountancy, medicine, fine arts, architecture, agriculture, selence, technology and engineering such that the appointment of these personsreflects a balance across the various fields:
Prờvided that the special focus or affiliation of the University, to be declared in the manner prescribed, may be reflected in the number of persons of distinction in an area of expertise relevant to the university whoare appointed to the Senate;
$e_{\text {. }}$ One person from amongst the alumni of the University;
f. two persons from the academic community of the country, other than an employee of the University, at the level of

## Professor or Principal of a College;

g. Two University Teachers;

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h. One person nominated by the Commission; and
i. The Registrar shall be the secretary of the Senate.
(2) The number of the members of the Senate described against clauses (f) to (i) of sub-section (1) may be increased by the Senate through Statutes subject to the condition that the total membership of the Senate does not exceed twenty- twenty-on a maximum of five University Teachers, and the increase is balanced, tothe extent possible, across the different categories specified in sub-section (1).
(3) All appointments to the Senate shall be made by the Chancellor. Appointments of persons described in clauses (f) to (g) of sub-section (1) shall be made from amongst a panel of three names for each vacancy recommended by the Representation Committee set up in terms of section 24 and in accordance with the procedure as may be prescribed:
Provided that effort shall be made, without compromisingwn quality or qualification, to give fair representation to women in the Senate.
Provided further that as regards the University Teachers described in clause (h) of sub-section (1) the Senate shall prescribe a procedure for appointment on the basis of elections that provide for voting by the various categories of University Teachers.

Provided also that the Senate may alternatively prescribe that appointment of University Teachers to the Senate shall also be in the manner provided by this sub-section for the persons described inclauses (f) to (g)df sub-section (1).
(4) Members of the Senate, other than ex-officio members, shall hold office forthree years. One-third of the members, other than ex-officio members, of the firstrestructured Senate, to be determined by lot, shall retire from office on the expiration of one year from the date of appoinment by the Chancellor. One-half of the remaining members, other than ex officio members, of the first restructured Senate, to be determined by lot, shall retire from office on the expiration of two years from the date of appointment and the remaining one-half,other than ex officio members, shall retire from office on the expiration of the third year.
Provided that no person, other than an ex-officio member, may serve onthe

Senate for more than two consecutive terms:
Provided further that the University Teachers appointed to the Senate may not servor two consecutive terms.
(5) The Senate shall meet at least twice in a calendar year.
(6) Service in the Senate shall be on an honorary basis: provided that actual expenses may be reimbursed as prescribed.
(7) In the absence of the Chancellor meetings of the Senate shall be presided over by such member, not being an employee of the University or the Governnent, as the Chancellor may, from time to time, nominate. The member so nominated shall be the convener of the Senate.
(8) Unless otherwise prescribed by this Act, all decisions of the Senate shall be taken on the basis of the opinion of a majority of the members present. In the event of the members being evenly divided on any matter, the person presiding over the meeting shall have a casting vote.
(9) The quorum for a meeting of the Senate shall be two-thirds of its membership, a fraction being counted as one.
17. Powers and functions of the Senate. _ (1) The Senate shall have the power of general supervision over the University and shall hold the ViceChancellor and the Authorities are accountable for all the functions of the University. The Senate shall have all powers of the University not expressly vested in'an Authority or officer by the Act and all other powers not expresslymentioned by this Act that are necessary for the performance of its functions.
(2) Without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing powers, the Senate shall have the following powers, namely:-
b. to approve the proposed annual plan of work, the annual andrevised;
c. to "hold, control and lay down policy for the administration of the pfoperty, funds and investments of the University, including the approval of the sale and purchase or acquisition of immovable preperty;
d. to oversee the quality and relevance of the University's academic programs and to review the academic affairs of the university in general;
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e. to approve the appointment of the Deans, Professers, Associate Professors and such other senior faculty and senior administrators as may be prescribed;
f. to institute schemes, directions and guidelines for the terms and conditions of appointment of all officers, teachers and other employees of the University;
g. to approve strategic plans;
h. to approve financial resource development plans of the University;
i. to consider the drafts of statutes and regulations proposed by the Syndicate and the Academic Council and deal with them in the manner as provided for in sections 27 and 28, as the case may be:
Provided that the senate may frame a statute or regulation on itsown initiative and approve it after calling for the advice of the syndicate or the Academic Council as the case may be;
j. to annul by order in writing the proceedings of any Authority or officer if the Senate is satisfied that such proceedings are not in accordance with the provisions of the Act, statutes or Regulations after calling upon such Authority or officer to show cause why such proceedings should not be annulled;
k. to recommend to the Chancellor removal of any momber of the Senate in accordance with the provisions of the Act;
I. to make appointment of members of the Syndicate, other than exofficio members in accordance with the provisions of the Act;
m . to make the appointment of members of the Academic Council, other than ex-officio members, in accordance with the provisions of the Act;
n. to appoint Emeritus Professors on such terms and conditions as may be prescribed;
o. to remove any person from the membership of any Authority if such person:-
i. has become of unsound mind; or
ii. has become incapacitated to function as member of such Authority; Or
iii. has been convicted by a court of law for an offence involving moral turpitude; and
p. to determine the form, provide for the custody and regulate the use of the common seal of the University.
(3) T*e Senate may, subject to the provisions of the act delegate all or any of the powers and functions of any Authority, officer or employee of the University at its main campus, to any Authority, committee, officer or employee at its additional campus for the purpose of exercising such powers and performing such functions in relation to such additional campus, and for this purpose the Senate may create new posts or positions at the additional campus.
18. Visifations. _ The Senate may, in accordance with the terms and procedures as maybe prescribed, cause an inspection to be made in respect of any matter connected with the University.
19. Syndicate._ (1) There shall be a Syndicate of the University consisting of thefollowing:

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** a the Vice-Chancellor who shall be its Chairperson;
* b the Deans of the Faculties of the University;
* c two Professors from different departments, who are not
        members of the Senate, to be elected by the University
        Teachers in accordance with the procedure to be prescribed
        by the Senate;
** d Principals/ Directors of the constituent colleges/institutes;
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    e the Registrar;
& the Treasurer, and
    g the Controller of Examinations;
    h the Director Academics/Quality Enhancement Cell(QEC).
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(2) MÉmbers of the Syndicate, other than ex officio members, shall holdoffice for three years.
(3) As regards the two Professors in clause (c) of sub-section (1) the Senate rimay, as an alternative to elections, prescribe a procedure for the proposal of a panel of names by the Representation Committee set up in
terms of section 24. Appointment of persons proposed by the Representation Committee may be made by the Senate on the recommendation of the Vice-Chancellor.
(4) The quorum for a meeting of the Syndicate shall be one-third of the total number of members, a fraction being counted as one.
(5) The Registrar shall also act as the secretary of the Syndicate.
(6) The Syndicate shall meet at least once in each quarter of the year.
20. Powers and Duties of the Syndicate._ (1) The Syndicate shall be the executive body of the University and shall, subject to the provisions of the Act and the Statutes, exercise general supervision ever the affairs and management of the University.
(2) Without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing*powers, and subject to the provisions of the Act, the Statutes, and directions of the Senate theSyndicate shall have the following powers:
a to consider the annual report, and the annual and revised budgetestimates and to submit these to the Senate;
b to transfer and accept transfer the of movableperty on behalfof the University;
c to enter into, vary, carry out, and cancel contracts on behalf ofthe University;
d to cause proper books of account to be kept for all sums of money received and expended by the University and for the assetsand liabilities of the University;
e to invest any money belonging to the University including any unapplied income in any of the securities described in section 20 of the Trusts Act, 1882 (Act II of 1882), or in the purchase of immovable property or in such other manner, as it may prescribe,with the like power of varying such investments,
$f$ to receive and manage any property transferred, and grants, bequests, trust, gifts, donations, endowmene, and other contributions made to the University.
$g$ to administer any funds placed at the disposal of the Universityfor specified purposes;
$h$ to provide the buildings, libraries, premises, furniture, apparatus, equipment and other means required for carrying out the work ofthe University;

* $i$ to establish and maintain halls of residence and hostels or approve or license hostels or lodgings for the residence of students;
* $j$ to recommend to the Senate affiliation or disaffiliation of

入 colleges/institutions;
$k$ to recommend to the Senate admission of educational

* institutionsto the privileges of the university and withdraw such privileges;

I to arrange for the inspection of Colleges and the departments;

* $m$ to institute Professorships, Associate Professorships, Assistant Professorships, Lectureships, and other teaching posts or to suspend or to abolish such posts;
n to create, suspend or abolish such administrative or other postsas may be necessary;
* O to prescribe the duties of officers, teachers and other employeesof the University;
p to report to the Senate on matters with respect to which it hasbeen asked to report;
q to appoint members to various Authorities in accordance with theprovisions of the Act;
* $r$ to propose drafts of Statutes for submission to the Senate;
$s$ to regulate the conduct and discipline of the students of theUniversity;
t to take actions necessary for the good administration of the University in general and to this end exercise such powers as arenecessary;
$u$ to delegate any of its powers to any Authority or officer or aCommittee; and
v to perform such other functions as have been assigned to it by the provisions of the Act or may be assigned to it by the Statutes.

21. Academic Council._ (1)There shall be an Academic ${ }^{2 \pi}$ Council of the University consisting of the following, namely:-
(a) the Vice-Chancellor who shall be its Chairperson;
(b) the Deans of faculties, Principals/Director of the colleges/institutes and such heads of departments as maybe prescribed;
(c) five members representing the departments, institutes andthe constituent colleges to be elected in the manner prescribed by the Senate;
(d) two principals of Affiliated Colleges;
(e) five Professors including Emeritus Professers;
(f) The Registrar:
(g) the Controller of Examinations; and
(h) the Librarian.
(2) The Senate shall appoint members of the Academic Council, other thanthe ex-officio and the elected members, on the recommendation of the Vice-Chancellor:

Provided that as regards the five Professors and the members representing thedepartments, institutes, and constituent colleges the Senate may, as an alternative to elections, prescribe a procedure for the proposal of a panel of names by the Representation Committee set up in terms of section 23. Appointment of persons proposed by the Representation Committee may bemade by the Senate on the recommendation of the Vice-Châncellor.
(3) Members of the Academic Council shall hold office for three years.
(4) The Academic Council shall meet at least once in each quarter.
(5) The quorum for meetings of the Academic Council shall be one third of the total number of members, a fraction being counted as one.
(6) The Registrar shall also act as the secretary of the Academic Council.
22. Powers and functions of the Academic Council._ (1) The Academic Council shall be the principal academic body of the University and shal? subject to the provisions of the Act and the Statutes, have the power to lay down proper standards of instruction, research and examinations and to regulate and promote the academic life of the University and the Colleges.
(2) Without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing powers, and subject tothe provisions of this Act and the Statutes, the Academic Council shall have the power to,
(a) approve the policies and procedures pertaining to the squality ofacademic programs;
(b) approve academic programs;
(c) approve the policies and procedures pertaining to student related functions including admissions, expulsions, punishments, examinationsand certification;
(d) approve the policies and procedures assuring quality of teaching andresearch;
(e) recommend the policies and procedures for affiliation of othereducational institutions;
*)
(f) propose to the Syndicate schemes for the constitution and organization of faculties, teaching departments and boards of studies;
(g) appoint paper setters and examiners for all examinations of the University after receiving panels of names from the relevant Authorities;
(h) institute programs for the continued professional development the ofUniversity Teachers at all levels;
(i) erecognize the examinations of other universities or examining bodies as equivalent to the corresponding examinations of the University;
(j) regulate the award of studentships, scholarships, $\star$
exhibitions，medalsand prizes；
（k）frame regulations for submission to the Senate；
（I）prepare an annual report on the academic performance of the University；and

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（ m ）perform such functions as may be prescribed by Regulations．
23．Representation Committees．＿（1）There shall be a Representation Committee constituted by the Senate through Statute for recommendation of persons for appointment to the Senate in accordance with the provisions of section 17.
（2）There shall also be a Representation Committee constituted by the Senate through Statute for the recommendation of persons for appointment to the Syndicate and the Academic Council in a $\varepsilon$ ordance with the provisions of sections 20 and 22.
（3）Members of the Representation Committee for appointments to the Senate shall consist of the following，namely：－
a．three members of the Senate who are not University Teachers；
b．two persons nominated by the University Teachers from amongst themselves in the manner prescribed；
c．One person from the academic community，not employed by the University，at the level of Professor or college Principal to be nominated by the University Teachers in the manner prescribed； and
d．one eminent citizen with experience in administration， philanthropy，development work，law or accountancy to be nominated by the Senate．
（4）The Representation Committee for appointments to the Syndicate andthe Academic Council shall consist of the following，namely：－
a．two members of the Senate who are not University Teachers；and
b．three persons nominated by the University Teachers fromamongst themselves in the manner prescribed；
（5）The tenure of the Representation Committees shall be three years：
Provided that no member shall serve for more than two consecutive
terms.
(6) * The procedures of the Representation Committees shall be as may beprescribed.
(7) There may also be such other Representation Committees set up by any of the other Authorities of the University as are considered appropriate for recommending persons for appointment to the various Authorities and other bodies of the University.
24. Appointment of Committees by certain Authorities._(1) The Senate, the Syndicate, the Academic Council and other Authorities may from time to time, appoint such standing, special or Advisory Committees, as they may deem fit, and may place on such committee persons who are not members of the Athorities appointing the committees.
(2) The Constitution, functions and powers of the Authorities for which no specific provision has been made in this Act shall be such as may be prescribed by Statutes or Regulations.

## Chapter V

## Statutes, Regulations and Rules

25. Statutes._(1) Subject to the provisions of the Act, Statutes, to be published in the official gazette, may be made to regulate orprescribe all or any of the following matters, namely:-
a. The contents of and the manner in which the annual report to bepresented by the Vice-Chancellor before the Senate shall be prepared;
b. the University fees and other charges,
c. the constitution of any pension, insurance, gratuity, provident fundand benevolent fund for University employees;
d. the scales of pay and other terms and conditions of service of officers, teachers and other University employees;
e. the maintenance of the register of registered graduates;
f. affiliation and disaffiliation of educational institutions and権latedmatters;
g. admission of educational institutions to the privileges of the University and the withdrawal of such privileges;
h. the establishment of faculties, departments, institutes, colleges and other academic divisions;
i. the powers and duties of officers and teachers;
j. conditions under which the University may enter into 新rangements with other institutions or with public bodies for purposes of research and advisory services;
k. conditions for appointment of Emeritus Professors and award of honorary degrees;
I. efficiency and discipline of University employees;
m . the constitution and procedure to be followed by Representation Committees in carrying out functions in terms of thisAct;
n . the constitution and procedure to be followed by the Search Committee for appointment of the Vice-Chancellor;
o. constitution, functions and powers of the Autharities of the University; and
p. all other matters which by this Act are to be or may be prescribed or regulated by Statutes.
(2) The draft of Statutes shall be proposed by the Syndicate to the Senate which may approve or pass with such modifications as the Senate may think fit ormay refer back to the Syndicate, as the case may be, for reconsideration of the proposed draft:

Provided that Statutes concerning any of the matters mentioned in clauses (a) and (1) of sub-section (1) shall be initiated and approved by the Senate, after seeking the views of the Syndicate:

Provided further that the Senate may initiate a Statute with respect to any matter in its power or with respect to which a Statute may be framed in terms of the Act and approve such Statute after seeking the views of the Syndicate.
26. Regulations. - (1) Subject to the provisions of the Act and the Statues, the Academic Council may make regulations, to be published' Th the official gazette, for all or any of the following matters, namely:--
(a) the courses of study for degrees, diplomas and certificates of the University;
(b) the manner in which the teaching referred to in sub-section (1) of section 6 shall be organized and conducted
(c) the admission and expulsion of students to and from theUniversity;
(d) the conditions under which students shall be admitted to the courses and the examinations of the University and shall becomeeligible for the award of degrees, diplomas and certificates;
(e) the conduct of examinations;
(f) conditions under which a person may carry on independentresearch to entitle him to a degree;
(g) the institution of fellowships, scholarships, exhibitions, medals and prizes;
(h) the use of the Library;
(i) the formation of faculties, departments and board of studies; and
(j) alkother matters which by the Act or the Statutes are to be or maybe prescribed by regulations.
(2) Regưlations shall be proposed by the Academic Council and shall be submitted to the Senate which may approve them or withhold approval or refer them back to the Academic Council for reconsideration. A Regulation proposed by the Academic Council shall not be effective unless it receives the approval of the Senate.
(3) Regulations regarding or incidental to matters contained in sub-clauses (g) and (i) shall not be submitted to the Senate without the prior approval of the Syndicate.
27. Amendment and repeal of Statutes and Regulations. _ The procedure for adding to, amending or repealing the Statutes and the Regulations shall be the same as that prescribed respectively for framing or making Statutes andRegu部tions.
28. Rules. - (1) The Authorities and the other bodies of the University may make rules, to be published in the official gazette, consistent with the Act, Statutes or the Regulations, to regulate any matter relating to the affairs of the University which has not been provided for by the Act or that is not required to be regulated by Statutes or Regulations, including Rules to Regulate the conduct of business and the time and place of meetings and
related matters.
(2) Rules shall become effective upon approval by the Syndicate.

## Chapter VI

3. 

## University Fund

29. University Fund. _ The University shall have a fund to which shall be credited its income from fees, charges, donations, trusts, bequests, endowments, contributions, grants and all other sources.
30. Audits and Accounts._ (1) The accounts of the University shall be maintainedin such form and in such manner as may be prescribed.
(2) The teaching departments, constituent colleges/institutes and all other bodies designated as such by the syndicate in terms of Statutesshall be independent cost centers of the University.
(3) All funds generated by a teaching department, constituent college or other unit of the University through consultancy, research or other provision of service shall be made available without prejudice to the budgetary allocation otherwise made, after deduction of overheads in the manner and to the extent prescribed by Statute, to the teaching department, constituent college or other unit for its developmient. A part of the funds so generated may be shared with the University teachers or researchers in charge of the consultancy, research or service concerned in the manner and to the extent prescribed by statutes.
(4) No expenditure shall be made from the funds of the University unlessa bill for its payments has been issued by the head of the cost center concerned in accordance with the relevant financial regulations and the treasurer/finance department has verified that the payment provided for in the approved budget of the cost center.
(5) Provision for an internal audit of the finances of the University shallbe made and prescribed in the Statutes.
(6) Without prejudice to the requirement of audit by an auditor appointed by Senate of the University in accordance with the provisions of any other law in force, the annual audited statement of accounts of the University shall be prepared in conformity with the generally accepted accounting
principles (gaap) by a reputed firm of chartered accountants and signed by the Treasurer and Vice-Chancellor. The annual audited statement of accounts so prepared shall be submitted to the Senate of theUniversity for the finalapproval.
(7) The observations of the external auditors, if any, together with such annotations as the treasurer may make, shall be considered by the Syndicate and shall be placed before the Senate within six months of closing of the financial year.

## Chapter VIII

General Provisions
31. Opportunity to Show Cause._ Except as otherwise provided by law noofficery teacher or other employee of the University holding a permanent post shall be reduced in rank, or removed or compulsorily retired from service for cause arising out of any act or omission on the part of the person concerned unless he has been given a reasonable opportunity of showing cause agatinstthe action proposed to be taken.
32. Appeal to the Syndicate and the Senate._Where an order is passed punishing any officer (other than the Vice-Chancellor), teacher, or another employee of the university or altering or interpreting to his disadvantage theprescribed terms or conditions of his service, he shall, where the order is passed by any officer or teacher of the University other than the ViceChancellor, have the right to appeal to the Syndicate against the order, and where the order is passed by the Vice-Chancellor, have the right to appeal to the Senate.
33. Service of the University._ (1) All persons employed by the University in accordânce with the terms and conditions of service prescribed by Statutes shall be personsin the service of the University.
(2) An officer, teacher or other employee of the University shall retire from service on the attainment of such age or tenure of service asmay be prescribed.
(3) No adverse change shall be made in the terms and conditions of employment of any University Teacher in the employment of the University on the date of enforcement of the Act.
34. Benefits and Insurance._ (1) The University shall constitute for the *

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benefit of its officers, teachers and other employees schemes, as may be prescribed, for the provision of post-employment benefits as well as health and life insurance while in service.
(2) Where any provident fund or gratuity scheme has been constituted under this act, its governing rules shall be approved by the Sente.
35. Commencement of term of office of members of Authority. when a member of a newly constituted Authority is elected, appointed or nominated, his term of office, as fixed under this Act, shallcommence from such date as may be prescribed.
(2) Where a member who has accepted any other assignment or for any other similar reason remains absent from the University for a period of not less thansix months, provided that the reasons for his absence were not beyond his control, he shall be deemed to have resigned and vacated his seat.
(3) A member of an Authority may resign from his membership by applying to the chairperson of the Authority. His seat shall fall vacant from the date his resignation is accepted by the competent authority i.e., the appointing Authority.
36. Filling of casual vacancies in Authorities. _ Any casual vacancy among the members of any Authority shall be filled, as soon as conveniently may be, in the same manner, and by the same person or Authority that had appointed the member whose place has become vacant and the person appointed to the vacancy shall be a member of such Authority for the residueof the term for which the person whose place he fills would have been a member.
37. Flaws in the Constitution of Authorities._ Where there is a flaw inthe constitution of an Authority, as constituted by this Act, the Statutes or the Regulations on account of the abolition of a specified officer because an organization, institution or other body outside the University has been dissolved or has ceased to function, or because of somether similar reason, such flaw shall be removed in such manner as the senate may direct.
38. Proceedings of Authorities not invalidated by the varancies.__ No Act,resolution or decision of any Authority shall be invalid by reason of any vacancy on the Authority doing, passing, or making it or by reason of any wantof qualification or invalidity in the election, appointment or nomination
of anyde facto member of the Authority, whether present or absent.
39. First Statutes and Regulations_ Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in the Act, the Senate shall promulgate the first Statues and Regulations which shall be deemed to be Statutes and Regulations framed under section 26 and 27 andshall continue to remain in force until amended or replaced or till such time asnew Statutes and Regulations are framed ${ }^{n}$ accordance with the provisions of the Act.
40. Transitory Provisions._(1) Notwithstanding anything contained in the Act, upon the coming into force of this Act with respect to a University, the members of the first Senate, except the University Teachers, shall be appointed by the Chancellor in accordance with the numbers and criteria for membershipspecified in the Act. The first Senate so constituted shall initiate, as soon as possible, the process for the appointment of the University Teachers and appointment of the members of the Syndicate and the Academic Council in accordance with the terms of this Act.
(2)Notwithstanding anything contained in the Act, the first Vice-Chancellor shall be appointed by the Chancellor for a period of three years.
41. Removal of difficulties. _ (1) If any question arises as to the interpretation of any of the provisions of the Act, it shall be placed before theChancellor whose decision thereon shall be final.
(2) If arficulty arises in giving effect to any of the provisions of theAct, the Chancellor may make such order after obtaining the views of the Senate, not inconsistent with the provisions of the Act, as may appear to him to be necessary for removing the difficulty.
(3)Where the Act makes any provision for anything to be done but no provision or no sufficient provision has been made as respects the Authority by whom, or the time at which, or the manner in which, it shall be done, then it Shall be done by such Authority, at such time, or in such manner as the Chancellor may direct after obtaining the views of the Senate.
42. Indemnity._ No suit or legal proceedings shall lie against the Government, the University or any Authority, officer or employee of the Government or the University or any person in respect of anything which is done ingood faith underthe Act.

## STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS

The proposed new university aims to create a transformative learning environment that nurtures intellectual curiosity, fosters research and innovation, and prepares students to become modern Islamic leaders. By adhering to its core values and promoting academic excellence, the university seeks to make a significant positive impact on society and contribute to the development of the national and international Islamic community guided with the teachings of Pan-Islamization Overall, the Mufti-e-Azam University envisions an institution that inculcates in its students the well-grounded roots of Islam in the light of Quran and Sunnah to respect humanity and social justice and to contribute in the society with their research in scientific fields. It seeks to cultivate individuals who are intellectually curious, morally upright, and committed to innovations leading to inventions. It is important to establish an Islamic University at Islamabad to provide high quality comprehensive educational opportunities to changing needs of the students, therefore, the bill is introduced, which aims at providing a charter for the establishment of Mufti-e-Azam Islamic University, Islamabad and to regulate its faculties, staff and students.
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
